Course Overview and Purpose

The purpose of this course is to assist students in conceptualizing a variety of psychological disorders from a scientist-practitioner framework. This course will present empirically supported information that is directly applicable to the human experience of disordered functioning and conduct. This course will build on basic foundational knowledge of psychology as a natural and social science gained in an introductory psychology course. As part of this course, students will explore specific psychological disorders in detail.

Objectives

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Describe the diagnostic features of the different disorders studied.
- 2. Discuss the different manifestations of psychological disorders.
- 3. Discuss and apply the biopsychosocial approach to understanding each psychological disorder studied.
- 4. Analyze and evaluate theories and treatments for disorders studied.
- 5. Analyze, synthesize, and evaluate case reports on psychological disorders.

<u>Methods of Instruction</u> Lecture and individual work will comprise the majority of class sessions. The role of the instructors will be to: present an overview of selected topics from the textbook, provide additional reading material and learning resources with up-to-date research findings, and provide timely feedback. Expectations for students are to attend class fully prepared, participate in class discussions, and read assigned materials prior to class in preparation for lecture.
